## Make sure you're correctly licensed

Did you know that you can be fined up to £1,000 if you are caught watching TV without a licence? More than 7,800 people in Birmingham were caught trying to evade the licence fee in the first nine months of 2008.

TV Licensing is working hard with local organisations across the West Midlands and Shropshire to ensure that people are aware of the circumstances when they have a legal responsibility to have a TV Licence.

Put simply, you need to be covered by a valid TV Licence to receive or record television programmes as they are being broadcast. This is the case whether you are receiving the programmes via TV or any other device, such as a mobile phone or a PC.
